Introduction and the theme

"We Humans are social beings. We come into the world as the result of others' actions. We survive here in dependence on others. Whether we like it or not there is hardly a moment of our lives when we do not benefit from others' activities. For this reason, it is hardly surprising that most of our happiness arises in the context of our relationships with others": - Dalai Lama

"Community connectedness is not just about warm fuzzy tales of civic triumph. In measurable and well-documented ways, social capital makes an enormous difference in our lives Social capital makes us smarter, healthy, safer, richer and better able to govern a just and stable democracy.": - Robert D. Putnam.

The concept of social capital has a large theoretical and practical meaning. Social capital is recognized as a factor of political consolidation, economic prosperity, civil society development, and a personal success. At the same time today becomes very important to find new and develop already-existing forms of social consolidation and economic development. One of such forms is recognized cooperatives.

Evolutionary anthropologists commonly describe humans as a highly cooperative species, based on our evolved socio-cognitive capacities. Cooperative behaviour is not unique to the human species. It is a widespread phenomenon between individuals of the same, and even different, species. Here we refer to cooperation in its broadest sense. Very high levels of cooperation are a trademark of several species, including humans and insect societies. Probably the most striking feature of human societies is their large size in combination with extensive cooperative behaviour between unrelated individuals. Cooperative behaviour is even found between complete strangers who are not likely to meet again in the future. Modern human societies strongly depend on high levels of cooperation between individuals, something we experience every day. Fostering our ability to cooperate is considered a key foundation for achieving sustainable development.

As it is recognized, humans are cooperative beings that strive to cooperate because "cooperation within a group is highly beneficial to its members" (Bowles, Gintis, 2011, pp. 46,196) and humans cooperate with a purpose to share information and other valued resources with a purpose to get a benefit. Cooperation is incorporation and interaction of two or more individuals in order to fulfill a particular task and achieve common goals in various areas of economic activity.



One must note that Human connection is not digital. Snapchat, TikTok, Twitter, Instagram, Facebook and any other platform I'm not cool enough to know about do not foster human connection. They can act as a starting point or provide information updates, but they don't even come close to the depth and excitement of true connection. Human connection is not a merely exchange of information. Human connection is something that can be cultivated and practiced. Human connection is risky. Human connection is active.

Some of the seemingly most intractable cooperation problems in the world today are the conflicts between rival nations and different political, economic, religious and ethnic groups. However, Fotouhi et al. show that a strong barrier to cooperation is simple lack of communication and suggest that promoting even sparse interconnections between previously segregated societies can support the evolution of cooperation globally.

This is the 75th year of India's independence. Therefore, as part of the Amrut Mahotsav, we will begin to connect cooperatives with all stakeholders and society, nationally and globally. This conference focuses to play an important role in strengthening Indian cooperatives on the national and global stage and work towards realising Prime Minister Narendra Modi's aim of 'Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas'.

Connect cooperatives with Youth and Women and then explore the innovative business opportunities with people centric approach are planned to be discussed in the Research Conference. 1. Abstracts

Researchers interested to present their papers in the Conference need to submit an abstract of not more than 600 words in Times New Roman, single spacing, 12 Fonts, Normal letters. The title should be in Times New Roman, 14 Fonts, and Bold. It should broadly include the research question, methodology, likely contribution to the field of knowledge and relevant literature. The keywords should contain 4-10 words. Send the abstract to ISSC, Pune by email at the following address: isscpune@yahoo.co.in The abstracts should be submitted in the following format:

- · Title of paper
- · Name(s) and affiliations of Authors
- · Main theme/objective of the paper
- · Methodological and/or Conceptual approach
- · Bibliography, Keywords and Contact details.

2. Full paper publication:

All submissions must be original and may not be under review by another Publication. Selected papers will be published as book chapters in an edited book with ISBN. The full **paper should be limited to 6000 words** in Times New Roman, single spacing, 12 Fonts, Normal letters. The title should be in Times New Roman, 14 Fonts, and Bold. The paper should be preferably based on primary data collection/case studies. Length of papers generally of six to eight pages in A-4 size paper. Paper should be sent in hard and soft copy.

3. Paper Presentation:

The mode of presentation, online and offline, need to be intimated after the acceptance of the paper. Best papers will be felicitated in the next (38th ANRC) conference. There will be no separate registration for paper presentations.
